In times of crisis, keeping the public informed is imperative, something Lake County Community Radio, Inc., understands.

KPFZ, 88.1 FM, Lake County’s only non-commercial community radio station, stepped up to support the information needs of a community, once again, hit hard by fire. Before the sun rose on the Sulphur Fire, radio programmers were on air.

With Internet and phone services down or interrupted, for many, radio was the only means to stay informed - especially in the initial hours and days of the fire emergency - before these services were fully restored.

Just as they’ve done during other local emergencies, radio station programmers were broadcasting live on air very shortly after word of the fire broke. Regular programming was suspended and programmers set aside their personal priorities to take calls from fire victims and others and provide the most up to date and accurate information available, round the clock. By immediately opening the airwaves to callers and local officials - including County Supervisors, Department Heads, Cal Fire representatives, the Sheriff and others the radio station provided a forum for direct and timely communication with an anxious and distressed community. Throughout the emergency radio programmers fielded calls providing updates and, when possible, linking callers to services. The station also provided information to worried Lake County residents who were away when the Sulphur fire erupted as well as out of county folks with family in the fire area.

From places near and far, through the wonders of live streaming, anyone with internet service could get information and stay posted on the status of the fire,

road closures, updates on evacuation orders and the like. To this point, many calls came in from people outside the county asking for updates they were unable to get in the briefings from mainstream media focused on other, larger, fires raging throughout Northern California.

It was gratifying to see the radio station listed as a source of information in some of the materials handed out at briefings. Working closely with fire and other local officials, the radio station provided a unique opportunity for direct communication to and with a concerned citizenry.

It's been said many times that when disaster hits, people come together to help one another. We saw this during the Valley, Rocky and Jerusalem fires; the Clayton fire; the flooding last winter and, most recently, the Sulphur fire. To this end, in times of crisis, you can count on local community radio to help keep the community informed on the latest information available. Day to day, listeners can find a broad array of music and talk programs ranging from local government affairs to gardening and everything in between. But when disaster hits, the only thing that matters is making sure people who need information, comfort and aid, can get it.

Our community radio station is a vital part of an important communication network in the most trying times as well as on a daily basis. We are a non-profit, listener supported, all volunteer community organization with a mission to provide a forum for freedom of expression and cultural diversity in the community. We are community based and receive no government funding.

Big thanks to our station manager, Andy Weiss; radio programmers and those who joined them on air with important information; and, of course, thank you to our listeners and callers.
